All applications must be submitted at least **90 days** prior to the date of the program unless other arrangements have been made. Grand Rounds applications must be submitted at least 30 days prior to the program date. For reference, below is the list of information required to submit an application. *Please note:* All required documents must be submitted <u>in their entirety</u> with the application before the approval process can begin.

Agenda & Marketing: Finalized program marketing and event handouts must be submitted to the Osteopathic Founders Foundation for approval BEFORE distribution. All publications must include the accreditation statement and logo of the Osteopathic Founders Foundation. Please note: The accreditation statement and high-resolution logo will be sent to you upon approval of this application. Once an application has been approved, a signed letter will be sent to you with the appropriate accreditation verbiage for publication. Please note: Your application form and the required documents must be submitted in their entirety before the approval process can begin.

## For Reference:

CME programs must address one or more of the AOA seven core competencies:

- I. Osteopathic philosophy and osteopathic manipulative medicine
- II. Medical knowledge
- III. Patient care
- IV. Interpersonal and communication skills
- V. Professionalism
- VI. Practice-based learning and improvement
- VII. System-based practice) (biomechanical, neurological, respiratory-circulatory, metabolic, and behavioral).

The five modes of osteopathic medicine are the cornerstone of osteopathic principles and philosophy (OPP). They provide the foundation of the basic and clinical sciences that are integrated into osteopathic medicine. These include:

- I. Biomechanical
- II. Neurological
- III. Respiratory-circulatory
- IV. Metabolic
- V. Behavioral

The Tenets of Osteopathic Medicine express the underlying philosophy of osteopathic medicine and were approved by the AOA House of Delegates as policy. These include:

- I. The body is a unit; the person is a unit of body, mind, and spirit.
- II. The body is capable of self-regulation, self-healing, and health maintenance.
- III. Structure and function are reciprocally interrelated.
- IV. Rational treatment is based upon an understanding of the basic principles of body unity, self-regulation, and the interrelationship of structure and function.
